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The Chairperson's Address

I am happy to inform that the 16th issue of SEWAK's annual report is now all set for your precious reviews and reading. The release also marks our triumphant arrival at another year of unperceived goodness and wonder. Long ago we decided on a course in social reconstruction, keeping in view the remoteness of the people of our region in sectors of education, health, livelihood and rights. Our plan of action was a three-pronged approach. It was, in the first place, to merge into their social system as a natural, neutral and ubiquitous transformation element; secondly, to use our information and skill to avail resources for transformation, and finally, to build up a pressure for change through persistence. It is due to your shaping influence and enthusiastic identification with ourselves we have been steadfastly moving toward our cherished goal. The symptoms of change are already evident across the region. By reciprocation, it has also transformed our organization into a distinctively professional and democratic institution of our time.

The last few years have seen sweeping changes in peoples' perceptions of socio-political issues affecting their lives. These changes are also evident in areas where we have been working. Communities have come together to demand their share of ration, allowance, land, jobs, information and services. Rather than shun public officials, they accompany them as peers in the implementation of developmental projects. Neither do they hesitate to censure public officials on objective grounds. There is also a process within the communities to chastise irrational elements through social pressure. These changes are, unmistakably the result of our decade long awareness campaigns in the area. There is much to be achieved on this front, but we are convinced that peoples' power has awakened from the state of stupor to a responsive and vibrant mode.

The WSHGs have proved to be an effective platform for evoking women ascendancy in society. We have been tending over seventeen thousand WSHGs under various programs. Ironically, disagreement and disruption rather than unison now rule their camps. Despite government's open commitment to promote, these groups have been hit hard by the mercenary scam of banking and insurance institutions. Recently, a representative body of WSHG pressed for 4 percent bank interest on loans. This evidences that groups are under financial strains and pressure. The high interest on loans, interest assessment on subsidy, sleeveless business-plans, unauthorised deduction of high insurance premium (often double their monthly savings) and interminable delay in the settlement of insurance claims put these entrepreneurs in a decisive test, which 95 out of 100 fail to qualify. It signals that the SHG movement could degenerate ruining their power irrecoverably. In many other examples as this, the parameters of development may be called into question. The plan and strategy seem sound but when we apply them, they bounce back reporting clog and regression.

From the Desk of Secretary

I extend my heartiest congrats to our friends and partners on the release of the 16th issue of our organization's Annual Report. May your trust and encouragement guide us as ever as we cross one level after another with our treasured humanitarian goals.

We have distinguished ourselves for our consolidative approach to the problem of development in the region. Our specialty lies in our teamwork and communicative skills. We have been working in the sectors of health, livelihood, rights and education since long addressing specific issues with a multitude of developmental tools that lends us with occasions for better intervention and synergy.

We took cognizance of the seriousness and urgency of humanitarian interventions in widely scattered areas of the district. The overly rural-tribal complexion together with topographical inaccessibility, superstitions and communal taboos were a menace to any developmental initiatives. Health indicators for incidence and death in malaria and tuberculosis, IMR and MMR were very dismal, and so were the other indicators regarding livelihood, literacy, drug abuse and standard of living. Obviously enough, despondency and ruin poised menacingly over the life of these folk and their posterity, and it was also clear that any odd or one-off initiative in this context would soon be beleaguered by the mess from surrounding sectors.

Interventions in such area need to be meaningful, holistic and productive of result. To engage the community, programs must render assets and cultures. Communities also disapprove parrot-fashion interactions as overriding and depreciatory. In the beginning, we intervened in the livelihood skill sector to garner support from young mass. We organized and strengthened CBOs, brought them to reflect on the grim issues of the community life. We followed them all the way through surveys, meetings and parleys, and when fund was available, prompted development of huge structures that still inspire action and thrift. We revisited these people and made them feel that they are indeed important to the rest of the world. In the way, we called forth a process of transformation that had lain dormant even after years of governmental initiatives.

I finally express my sincere gratitude for our Donors, the Concern World Wide, the Trickle Up Foundation, the Edukans, the CYSD, Government Departments at District, State and Central level, Public Officials, our Partners and Network, Friends and employees who have served as immitigable source of our strength, inspiration and wisdom. I also express my deep regard for our former staff, late Shiva Shankar Bagh and late Bhimsen Mahanta, who died at very young age setting examples of dedication and hard work for all of us to follow. May God bring fruition to the cause they are fighting for and bring them peace in the afterworld.

Background & Brief History

By mid-nineties numerous youth clubs under the aegis of Nehru Yuva Kendra were at work across the district of Sundargarh. They helped in the extension of governmental programs, such as promotion of Integrated Household Latrines, Million Well, Indira Awaas, nursery raising & afforestation, which were formerly done by government departments. The district administration felt the need of a district level NYK unit to coordinate and guide the activities. Mr. Gopal Chandra Ojha, the NYK, District Youth Coordinator, incumbent District Collector Ms Alka Panda and Mr. Saroj Jha, Project Director took a consolidative step by arranging an apex meeting of the volunteers on 23rd March 1995. It is at this meeting that SEWAK got its name. An old rotting premises of District Industries Department at Mahulpali, locally known as Industry area was chosen to be the venue. The decomposed rooms were revamped and rendered to the incipient organization from which it started to organize and spur youth activities in near and far away areas. The organization was registered under Societies Registration Act at Sundargarh on 15th May 1995. However, the hard task of translating its ethics to real action fell on the shoulders of a young team of dedicated and energetic NYK volunteers. They raised nurseries for youth clubs, linked farmers schemes, promoted cultivation of potato and onion and put over 20 acres under banana plantation.

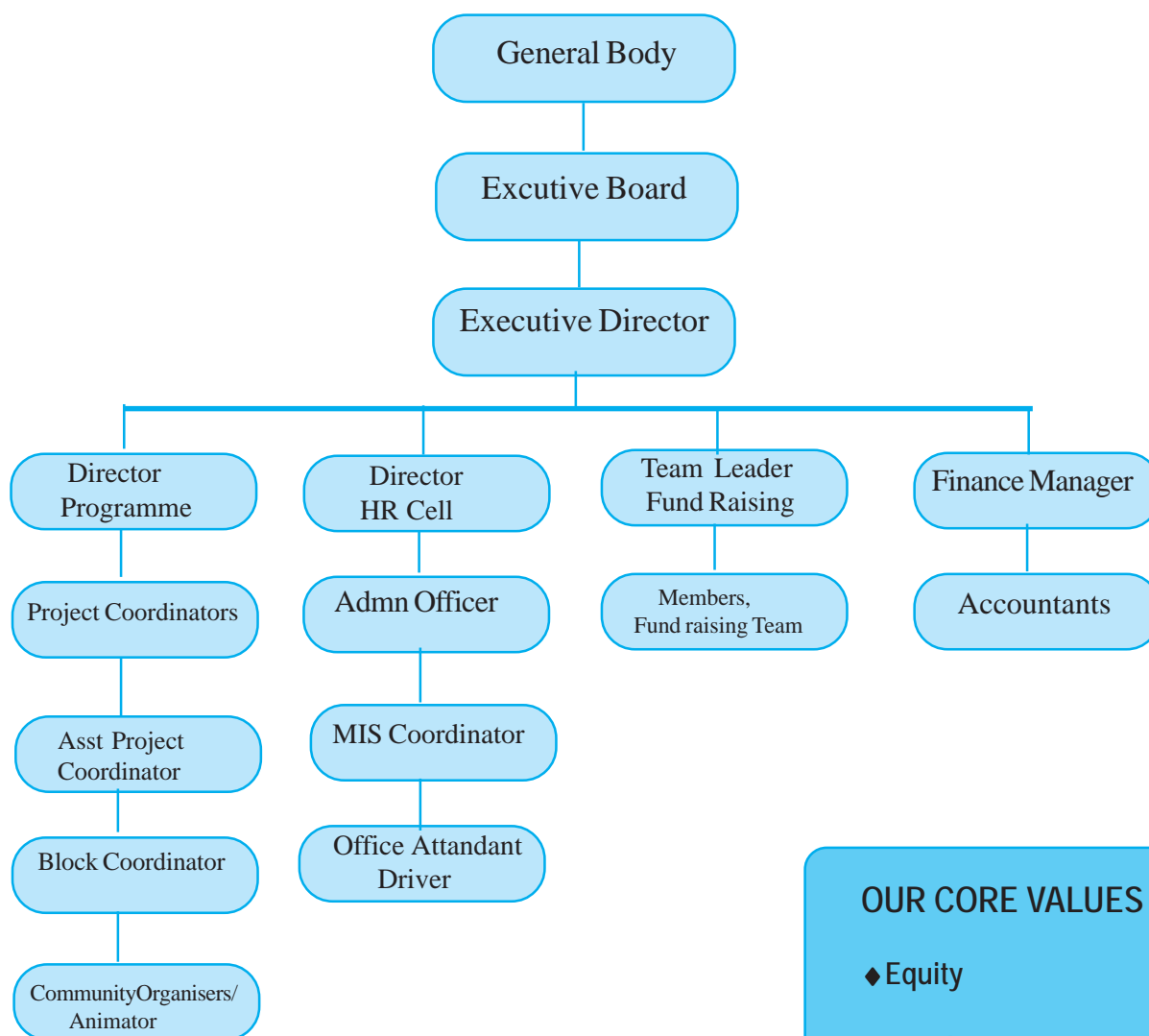
In the meanwhile, with the transfer of patronizing officials the interest in youth activity ebbed away, and like many other compeers, SEWAK was left to wobble; but these volunteers did not give up. With determination and optimism, they took over the management of the organization. They trudged the countryside raising funds for free skill trainings and conducted programs on Motorcycle/bi-cycle repair, Tailoring, Fabrication and Bamboo Craft for rural youths.. Toys and household goods made by these trainees from bamboo root ranked as unique at National level Trade Fairs held at Chennai, Delhi, Lucknow and Ahmedabad. Between '98 and 2000, SEWAK received several awards including the first place in Outstanding Youth Club category at the National level. There were more struggles ahead, but the tough course of the journey had begun to feel engaging and adventurous.

Strengthening Local Self Governance Program (PRA,Sundargarh Network)

Sundargarh, the second largest district in the state of Orissa in term of land area has an overly tribal population. The district is enlisted under the fifth schedule of Indian Constitution, but owing to illiteracy, backwardness and lack of information of people, it is yet to taste the benefits of both Panchyat Raj and Panchayat Extension to Schedule Areas (PESA) Acts. There is need of intensive intervention from both Government and Civil Societies to realize these acts in the best interest of its inhabitant.

Labor with a difference



Panchayati Raj Abhiyan, Sundargarh, a network of 12 NGOs is running a programme called Strengthening Local Self Governance in Sundargarh district. SEWAK is the lead partner in the network. The program puts emphasis on making the Panchyat Raj institutions vibrant, which would in turn deliver better services to deprived masses of the Society.

Gailjore, one of the small revenue villages of Meghdega GP is situated six kms away from GP Headquarters. The village comprises of four hamlets, namely Bamdiadera, Dungalala Mirdhadunga and Dhabadoli. From very old times, the hamlets have grown up on Reserve Forest areas. One Hamlet Bamdeidera is located high up the hills. Nearly eighty families have built their permanent homes on this hilltop settlement. Incidentally, all houses except three stood on encroached forest land in the Reserve Forest area.

By virtue of their isolation, the people lived the life of the old forest dwellers. All most all families depended on NTFP collection and daily wages. With fewer livelihood options available to them, economic hardships were a common occurrence in every family. There was also regular harassment from forest department official during fetching of NTFP items and firewood. Neither could they avail themselves of housing schemes of government as IAY, as they did not have any revenue land in their name.

SEWAK began working around the area from 2005 by way of implementing the Panchayati Raj Aviyan program. The volunteers generated awareness among people on schemes like MGNREGA, Right to Information and Food and

Social Security. With ‘Schedule Tribes and Other Traditional Forest Dwellers’ Recognition of Forest Right Act, 2006’ coming into effect from 1st Jan, 2008, a new hope was kindled in the heart of the villagers. Meanwhile, the District administration took a proactive step to involve SEWAK in the implementation process of FRA. It proved to be of great help for the villagers. SEWAK’s volunteers facilitated villagers in filling of forms, collection of evidence and coordination with Revenue and Forest officials for joint verifications.

In terms of the Govt. notification, the village constituted its Forest Rights Committee (FRC) on 16th March 08. Since its first sitting, the FRC started receiving individual and community claims for forestland. Once the process of receiving of forms was over, the FRC sent intimation to the Tahsildar and Welfare Extension Officer of Tangarpali Block. Consequently, in September 2008, the Forestor and RI came to the village for joint Verification. The villagers made a last minute review of the claims in a Gram Sabha and in December 2008, submitted all the claim forms before SDLC, Sundargarh. Meanwhile, the SDLC officials lost all the claim forms, but fortunately, the Claimants had the photocopies of all relevant documents, and the forms were submitted to SDLC for a second time on April 2009.

After a gap of 10 months, on November 2010, fifty Claimants of the village got FRA entitlements. The event was received with much cheer and delight as acquiring of land title promised a new world of opportunities. One Jakrias said, “Forest Right Act has relieved us permanently form the oppression of Revenue & Forest Officials”. Now SEWAK has helped eight of the Claimants to submit all required documents, along with photocopies of their new ‘Patta’ to the Horticulture Officer for benefitting from a subsidy linked scheme which will be operative in July 2011.

Devolution of power to Panchayat Raj Institutions at grass root level also calls for a system for educating the elected representatives on different aspects of Panchayati Raj Systems. A larger fraction of representatives usually hail from backward communities and possess very little or no information on functioning of local self-government at the time of assuming office. Unless they have good knowledge of rules of procedure affecting these institutions, they would not be able to execute their role properly.

For the past four years, SEWAK has been conducting training programs for PRI members of Sundargarh district as SIRD's district partner (DPNGO). Training classes are usually held at RRC premises, where SEWAK has build up an impressive training infrastructure with AC conference room, training hall, gents and ladies hostel, and mess hall.

Back to basics for bigger roles



Between 1st of May and 30th of October 2010, a total of 1171 representatives from Tangarpali, Lephripara, Hemgir, Subdega, Balishankara, Bargaon, Rajgangpur, Kutra and Kuanrmunda Blocks undertook training from empanelled resource persons (DLTs and SLTs) and govt. officers on subjects such as, salient features and structure of PRIs, role of PRI representatives, function and role of standing committees, devolution of power, PRIs and rural development and on schemes like NREGS, IAY, SGSY, BRGF and Gopabandhu Vikash Yojana.

Adding to trend a watershed at Nuniapali



In December 2004 SEWAK, with support received from Concern World Wide, Ireland launched Livelihood Development Project (LDP) in twenty-five villages of Gurundia & Boneikela Gram Panchayats of Gurundia Block in Sundargarh district. The program entered a second phase in June 2008 and continued with some spatial extensions for another three years before finally closing on December 2010. The Livelihood Development Program was a unique intervention of its kind that touched almost every aspect of people's life, and over its seven years of existence, SEWAK became a household name in the tribal communities to be remembered for years.

In the first phase of its implementation the Livelihood Development Project laid emphasis on community resource management, strengthening of CBOs and skill building. SEWAK livelihood team help set up 25 Village Development Committees (VDCs), 25 Farmers Associations (FAs) and 31 Woman Self Help Groups (WSHG) in the target villages. Another milestone achievement of this

period was the construction of two diversions cum water harvesting structures at Dharnipur and Nuniapali villages of Boneikela Gram Panchayat. The people of these two villages evinced remarkable co-operation for building these structures. Much as their expectations, the grand structures still stand today, providing water for vegetable crop and scope for community actions. The Nuniapali VDC, for instance, has over Rs 30, 000 in its account, which has come from community-level fish farming in the WHS's water pool.

During this period, emphasis was also laid on linking the community to various nodal agencies offering support on a variety of productive activities. These interactions ushered in various initiatives in the sectors of agriculture, animal rearing, fish-farming, vegetable cultivations and water supply. Large tract of land near water sources in Jamundara, Jadaloi, Dumermunda, Boneikela Dharnipur, Nuniapali and Tamra was put under vegetable cultivation. Livestock rearing, poultry and piggery also went up dramatically. WSHGs in Bhurung, Jamudarah and Dharnipur rose to prominence for lakh cultivation. Timely organization of skill trainings by LDP in these and other subjects proved effective for consolidating IGAs newly undertaken by program participants.

In the modern parlance of elected governments and welfare states socio-political rights constitute an important livelihood component by ensuring minimum livelihood guarantees to beneficiaries. So, by its second term in 2008 the focus had shifted to activity that would secure people's access to governmental schemes specially, the MNREGA, FRA, RTI and Social Security measures like, BPL benefits, Old age pensions, Annapurna and Antodyoya. Several initiatives were taken to secure peoples' access to these schemes. The work proved easier, as the necessary social institutions and motivations to accomplish these goals having been laid out in the region.

The effects of the Livelihood Development Project in the life of the tribal communities of Gurundia & Boneikela GP were far-reaching in scope. The first of its kind in the region, it brought communities to bear on the socio-political development that was taking shape in rural India. It built in them capacity and skill to man organizations, raised their level of their commonsense to see through the dynamics of change. Even as the project has come to an end, SEWAK would continue to interact with the 31 WSHGs and Village Development Committees through its micro-finance development and community awareness programs in the region, and by the way, exist as a trusted partner of communities in the development process in days to come.

TRICKLE UP PROGRAM

The Trickle Up Program, implemented by SEWAK since August 2007 with the support of Trickle Up Foundation of USA is meant for improvement of quality of life of poorest of the poor people through promotion of livelihood activities and thrift. It assists very poor women & their families with seed capital and other support to work their way out of poverty with dignity. Other supports include skill enhancement training, employment opportunity and health awareness.

In the current phase (2010-13) the program seeks to intensify its activity in Bargaon Block reaching out to a record number of poor families.

The participants for the program are selected through a long-drawn exercise consisting of PRA, wealth ranking, social mapping and poverty assessment. The Foundation insists on strict standards to ensure that they in fact belonged to the poorest of the poor families of the community.

The project participants for the program are selected through a long-drawn exercise consisting of PRA, wealth ranking, social mapping and poverty assessment. The Foundation insists on strict standards to ensure that the participants in fact belonged to the poorest of the poor families of the community. Next comes, the task of livelihood planning when trickle up staff analyze the socio-economic background of the area, market condition and feasibility for the proposed livelihood activity. Final decision is made after preparation of individual plan, small group discussion and SHG level discussion. The grant size for each participants amounts to Rs 11, 280, transferrable in maximum of two installments. It also provides for subsistence allowance at the rate of Rs 18/- during the lean and pregnancy period for a period of 2 and 3 months respectively.

Health awareness consists of an important component of support. SEWAK staffs creates consciousness on personal hygiene, specially washing of hands after defecation and before cooking or eating food. They inform the project participants how disease can be prevented through adoption of better hygienic practices. They also create awareness for existing health facilities, their utilisation, review of health status of program participants and problem solving.

Sunanda Oram resides in Khadiapada in Tangarmunda village with her husband & son. The family depends on agriculture and daily labor for their livelihood and lives in very poor conditions. When Trickle Up program started in their village, Sunanda also figured on the name list as a prospective program participants.

During the livelihood selection stage, the Trickle Up staff conducted several meetings with her. Finally, Sunanda revealed her determination to take up vegetable cultivation. The program team supported her in terms of seeds, fertilizer and pesticide. She also opted for a goat for rearing as a side business. In due course, she got training on vegetable cultivation and goat rearing with other program participants. Soon with her determination and hard work, Sunanda succeeded in transforming vegetable cultivation to a remunerative family occupation. Her husband and elder son also helped her in her farm work. Now the family earns more. Sunanda expect to expand the area under cultivation in the following season.

Skill Development Training

Skill development is one of the oldest and more commonplace developmental activities on SEWAK premises. Since 1995, and even before registering itself as a society, the volunteers had been going to remote villages to persuade young boys and girls to free, residential skill trainings held on its campus. SEWAK has organized numerous training programs under TRYSEM, NABARD, SGSY and RSVY schemes. The subjects of training usually include Carpentry, Masonry, Bamboo Craft, Tailoring or Soft-toy Making. Unemployed young boys and girls of the rural interior who cannot pursue a career due to their level of education or backwardness of area find these trades profitable. Over these years, more than 3450 young boys and girls have qualified as craftsman in one or other trade of their choice and have been engaged profitably in or near their localities. The training section of SEWAK also keeps track of the alumni to keep them abreast of latest training programs they could take advantage of.

Masonry Training for Tribal Youths

In 2010-11, SEWAK organized a masonry training program for twenty tribal youths of Tangarpali Block area at SEWAK head office complex. ITDA, Sundargarh provided support for this residential program going for 6 months. The trainees were provided accommodation and boarding at the trainees' hostel close to the training complex

Skill Development Program under SGSY

With the active co-operation from DSMS-DRDA, Sundargarh in the district, SEWAK during 2010-11 organized a series of Skill Trainings for WSHG members selected as beneficiaries under Swarnajayanti Gramya Swarajagata Yojana (SGSY) scheme. WSHGs of Hemgir, Tangarpali and Rajgangpur Blocks benefitted from these programs.

In 2010-11, SGSY beneficiaries received training in Dairy Development, Goat Rearing, Vegetable Cultivation and Rice Processing. A total of 187 SHG members attended training classes conducted by Government officers of Veterinary, Horticulture and Agriculture departments

Some programs were conducted at SEWAK's own training facility at Rangiamunda where as some others were conducted in places close to the beneficiaries' village. Government officers of Veterinary, Horticulture and Agriculture departments at the Block and District level led the sessions as resource persons.

Manoj Bhoi of village Surda in Kiripsira Gram Panchayat Sundargarh enrolled as a trainee under the three-month Masonry Training Program of SEWAK in June, 2007. During the counseling, when asked, why in spite of his +2 level education he preferred to join this course, he said that he lived in a family of four which depended on the small earning from his fathers' gupchup vending, and that rather than sit idle and wait for a job, he liked to contribute to his family income by the use of his wit and labor..

During his three-month long stay at Rangiamunda Complex, Manoj paid attention to his study, trying to learn every aspect of the trade perfectly and graduated with an A-grade. He immediately contacted a senior mason of the area who agreed to employ him as his associate. The association opened him to a variety of on-going constructions in the village and Sundargarh town. Within a year or two, Manoj established an identity of his own. Now, he is working independently earning around six to seven thousands every month.



Craft Village Program

SEWAK implemented Craft Village Program for another six months between 1st November 2009 and 30th April 2010. Supported by District Industries Center, Sundargarh the program aimed at promotion of Bamboo Craft and craft based Income generating activities by women self-help groups. Under the program SEWAK set up three Craft Village Centers (CVCs) at Patkijore, Khuntagaon and Aleikera village in Tangarpali Block. Each of the Center enrolled 15 poor, tribal women trainees and guided them through a series of theoretical and practical lessons in designing bamboo based articles and household items. DIC's empanelled Master Crafts Men conducted these trainings.

SEWAK's volunteers also facilitated formation of three Self-Help Groups consisting of the trainees in each of the three CVCs. During the course of the Training, the SHG would raise its fund by selling the products designed at these training centers. Afterwards, they would be eligible to apply for subsidy based loan from the government for starting joint entrepreneurship in bamboo craft production and sale.

Tailoring Training Program

To the interest of a circle of young learners, SEWAK hosted a Tailoring training program for women at its Rangiamunda complex between April and June 2011. A total of 30 girls trainees enrolled themselves for the three-month tailoring course. It being a self-funded program, the trainees paid a small amount each towards the Trainer's fee. SEWAK provided its workshop, sewing machines and TLT materials free of charge for the use by the young trainees. They would also receive grade certificate from SEWAK's Training Section following its completion.

Entrepreneurship Development Program

In the period 2010-11, SEWAK, for the second year in succession conducted another series of Entrepreneurship Development Trainings at its training facilities located in Rural Resource Center in Bandhapali. A total of 107 entrepreneurs sponsored by KVIC, Bhubaneswar undertook training in six widely batches at different times during the year.

Under the Prime Minister's Employment Generation Program (PMEGP) steps are taken to create employment opportunity for enterprising youths through promotion of credit-linked microenterprises. The Entrepreneurship Training Program (EDP) prepares the youths for entrepreneurial activities by providing knowledge and skill on a broad range of subjects following a training module developed with great pragmatism and care. The candidates are usually sponsored by KVIC, Bhubaneswar, DIC, Sundargarh and Identified Banking Institutions.

The training module touched on a wide array of topics as systematic approaches, costing, pricing and profit management, TAT, material management, account and book keeping, quality management, IT factors, sustainability precautions, product diversification, designing and packaging, marketing strategies, sale tax and income tax etc. including an exposure visits to a successful enterprise.

Reproductive and Child Health, RCH-II Program

MNGO, SEWAK together with its FNGO partners, the Vikas Prastitan (VP), Bonaigarh; Banajyoti Yuvak Sangha (BYS), Gurundia and CAUSE, Nuagoan partnered in RCH-II program in Sundargarh from 1 April 2007. In January 2011, the program was further extended for a period of six months. The program meant to give coverage to a population of 40946 living in 7373 H.H. under 11 sub-centers located in four community blocks. in Sundargarh district.

MNGO and its three FNGO partners organized a Mega Swasthya Mela at Lahunipara Block Play ground from 12th to 14th February 2011. Volunteers helped the patients for getting service at the specific stall. SEWAK's street-play performance on was visited by three thousand spectators from nearby villages. MNGO/FNGO volunteers distributed leaflets on various health topics.

MNGO & Partners organized the 1st and 2nd round IPPI from 23 to 25 January and from 27 February to 1st March 2011. The two transit teams at Church chawk and Kirei check-post fed Polio drops to 356 children.

Between 27 January and 24 March 2011, series of trainings were organized for the MNGO/ FNGO staff at RRC, Bhubaneswar on service delivery mechanism under RCH-II. SEWAK organized an analogous program for FNGO field staff on its premises between 4th and 6th March. It was conducted by senior doctors and NRHM officials from Sunargarh District Health Society.

HEALTH

An MNGO/FNGOs' Program Launching Cum Stakeholder Workshop was held on 3rd March 2011. Dr. R.K. Chaudhury, CDMO in Charge inaugurated the workshop. The participants noted the importance of FNGO participation in promoting RCH-II based objectives. field staff on its premises between 4th and 6th March. It was conducted by senior doctors and NRHM officials from Sunargarh District Health Society.

Sanamati Singh (34) resides in Pankadihi village under Pankadihi Sub-center of Gurundia Block. She has two sons. Due to inaccessibility and remoteness of the village, the villagers have few livelihood options available to them. Sanamati's husband worked as a daily labourer fetching a very small income for the family and Sanamati, like most of her peers led the life of a poor NTFP collector. To add to her unhappiness, she was suffering from a menstrual disorder. For about two weeks preceding and following her period, she felt pain in her abdomen and it made her look very weak and panicking. During these days, she stops going to forest and often lie down on the floor pressing her

belly against a bale of cloth. On this account, the family has more suffering; the children are unhappy, and her husband keeps grumbling from worries.

Sanamati consulted a Quack who used to come to the village once a week, but the treatment had hardly any effect on her and there was no decrease in pain.

One day, Padmini Singh, a community organizer from Banajyoti Yuvak Sangha, a network partner of RCH- II program, made a door-to-door visit in the hamlet where Sanamati lived. By the by, she came to know about the illness of Sanamati . Padmini visited her personally, listened to her problem and consoled her by her words. She asked her to come for a check up to the health camp scheduled to be organized on 24th Feb 2011 in Pankadihi village by the RCH- II Network. Sanamati did so; she talked to the doctor who provided her with medicines. She took all the medicine as per doctor's suggestions. The following menstruation period passed off smoothly. Sanamati was very happy now. She commented, "It is due to the BYS that the treatment came to my doorstep".

Urban Slum Health Project

Slums bring to the mind the picture of over-congestion and squalor, poverty and illiteracy. Many serious social problems and health complications, including HIV/AIDS breed in the slum, calling forth special attention of government and health authorities. Since 1st November 2007, SEWAK has been running a 1st tier Urban Health Centers on PPP mode at Tilkanagar in Bondhamunda. The project would cover 23 slums with a total population of 23004.

During the period 2010-11, a total of 223 delivery cases were linked with Rourkela Government Hospital of which 121 women were given initial financial support for institutional delivery. Family Planning is another important areas of Urban Health Project. In the same period 36 women and 2 men turned up for tubectomy and NSV respectively.

SEWAK's Urban Health Volunteers organized 41 outreach health camps in inaccessible areas to provide health facilities at the doorstep of slum population. 2480 patients were examined and treated in those camps. In addition, the team provided referral to serious patients, organized awareness meeting and provided counseling to pregnant mothers and adolescent girls.

Reproductive adolescent health is a major concern for National Rural Health Mission. To create awareness on reproductive health issues among adolescent girls, 30 Balika Mandals have been formed in the slums. During the period the USHP team

organized 60 Balika mandal meeting and 12 Adolescent training in different area. Twenty quiz competitions were also organized among adolescent girls to appraise their awareness of pressing issues.

Free laboratory test facility is one of the relevant areas of service delivery. The people of slum area cannot afford for such tests as they grow costlier every day. During the reporting period 1786 people benefited from laboratory test for different complications.

Antenatal Checkups serves to secure the growth of the fetus and relieve the worries of reproductive mother, but few women of the slum ever show up for such tests. Incidentally, 280 women availed themselves of ANC facilities at the Urban Health Center between second and twelfth weeks of their pregnancies.

In the coverage area, thirty Community Based Distribution (CBD) Centers have been formed for Social Marketing of Contraceptives. The USHP team organized 12 CBD trainings where 318 persons were provided training regarding contraceptives promotion.

To create awareness in the public at large, the USHP also organized intensive pulse polio immunization and swine flu awareness camp at Rourkela Railway Station.

Timely Help Saved the Family from Destitution

Pintu Jojo is 40 year old. He lives in Nepali Basti Slum with his wife, son and two daughters. Both Husband and wife work on daily wages and earn around Rs 3000 a month but as both are alcohol addicts, they spend most of their earning on alcohol. As a result, the family suffers many problems.

The day was 15th November 2010. Pintu, who had been seriously ill for few days, succumbed to his illness that morning. Sombari, his wife was also seriously ill from fever. She was very weak and could not go out for work. They had no money at all. The children were too young to fetch money and food. Due to their financial state, they were not able to get food, let alone go to the govt. hospital for treatment. At this time, one of the slum dweller informed the Urban slum health centre of their plight. Link Volunteer Asha Khalkho and Sangita Naik ANM spared no time to visit Sombari in her house. The symptoms resembled malaria and she had suffered for a week already. Her two daughters and son were also not physically well. For a week, they had been taking food from AWWs Centre to survive. Sangita strongly recommended that the patient be hurried up to the Rourkela Govt. Hospital. But since they had nothing to pay for transport and food, the USHP team provided them with financial support for moving to the Govt. Hospital 25 Km away.

After five days for intensive treatment, Sombari began to show symptoms of recovery. She was immensely grateful to the USHP team for their timely assistance. She promised to curb her alcohol consumption and look after the children.

Janani Sewa Program

One of the measures adopted by NRHM to reduce IMR/MMR is offering of 24x7 hours telephonic counseling to reproductive and expectant mothers across the district. SEWAK undertakes to do the job at the Janani Sewa Kendra set up under Janani Sewa Program at Sundargarh District Hospital.

Tele-counseling has proved very effective for transmitting confidence to troubled mothers and their relatives anywhere in the district. Purposeful location of the center within the district headquarters' general ward comes in handy for the tele-counselors, who could seek immediate reference from doctors and staff nurses on duty to answer specific queries of the callers. Anyone, anywhere in the district can seek information from the center by dialing Janani Sewa Kendra Telephone no. **9437701234**. They can also request Janani Express, or Janani Sewa Vehicle facility to speed up a case for delivery, in which case, the tele-counselor would contact with the Janani Express staff available closest to the caller's residence. Ten Janani Expresses have been set in readiness for such exigencies at different places in the district.

In 2010-11, the counseling center attended to several phone calls seeking counseling and vehicular service from Janani Sewa Kendra.

Communication Health India Network (CHIN) Project

To fulfil its goal of ensuring peoples' universal access to public health, NRHM launched a parallel initiative in form of CHIN for CHANGE Project. It is an acronym standing for Communication for Health India Network (CHIN) for Communication, Health, Advocacy, NRHM, Grass-root, and Empowerment (CHANGE). It signifies a line of effort within NRHM to close gaps in health service delivery through participatory communication initiatives, advocacy for health related entitlement and capacity building of stakeholders. CHIN is a network of five national level partners led by CMAI. In January 2010, SEWAK was involved to implement the program in Tangarpali Block.

Following CHIN interventions in Tangarpali area, several significant changes occurred in people's perception of public health. It brought change in organizing VHNDs properly with ASHAs, AWWs and ANMs

- ▶ People successfully aired their grievances that led to appointment of doctor at Mangespur CHC
- ▶ Responding to people's complaint CDMO openly committed to bring drastic changes in the behavior of doctors and ANMs during treatment
- ▶ The project covered 74 villages in Tangarpali Block and sensitized people on health issue
- ▶ Active participations of youth, PRI, CBOs and FNGO was ensured in Village Health Plans
- ▶ Regular updating of Swasthya Kantha & regular home visits by CHIN staff
- ▶ Street-plays inspired people to engage in sanitation & hygiene improvement

Community Awareness Meeting at Tinikoda village

Mr. Bharat Singh (35) lives in Jada village of Pankadihi GP in Gurundia block. He is a farmer with a smallholding of ancestral land. His economic condition is not very good. To supplement to his family income he often has to go out for wage work. He is a BPL card holder. His family consists of his wife, one daughter and three sons. Though he realized that their family was over-sized, yet due to lack of knowledge of family planning measures, they did not make use of contraceptives, nor adopted any surgical procedures.



Once, Mr. Rajkumar Singh the Community Organizer of Banajyoti Yuvak Sangha (BYS) visited his family. As the two knew each other from a long time, he freely shared Bharat's concern on the size of his family. He informed Bharat of some permanent measures of Family Planning. At that time, Bharat said that he should be interested in adopting tubectomy for his wife. Actually, he was afraid of adopting NSV for himself lest he might lose his masculinity and be ridiculed by his companions. Rajkumar knew it from his expressions, but he did not make any comment and invited him to forthcoming Eligible Couples' meeting to be held at Jada on 18th Feb 2011.

At the meeting Mr. Dhabaleswara Nanda P.C. BYS, RCH-II program discussed at length on NSV. He offered examples of many successful persons who had undertaken NSV. He explained that personality is absolute and is not affected by minor changes in physique. His points were convincing and it made Bharat mentally prepare for an NSV operation.

Finally on 12th March 2011 Bharat underwent NSV operation. Now his health is good and he is happy. He said "NSV can be done without feel of pain. It is so easy and good".

THE HOPE OF THE PEOPLE



Sanjulata is now 35 year old. After her +2 she discontinued her study, and in due course married to Mr.

Chandra Patel of Chakramal village. From childhood, she bore a

desire to help people of her village. Fortunately she was selected as an ASHA in June 2006 and underwent 7 days induction training. She also received thematic training of 16 days and 5th module ASHA training for 4 days.

She actively participated in the community awareness meeting organized by CHIN project staff in Chakramal. Maternal death and infant death due to home delivery was a great problem in the area. She visited every home of her village to ascertain pregnancy, distributed IFA tablets, examined their blood pressure at regular intervals. On one critical instance, she herself arranged for the ambulance to carry the pregnant lady to the District Hospital and secured the lives of the mother and the child. This act made her popular among the natives.

Of all 18 deliveries made last year in her village, none was a home delivery. She identified six T.B patients and treated them through DOTs. She referred 22 malaria positive cases to District Head Quarter Hospital and got them cured. In recognition of her service to people, Mr. Sibanatha Delki- Block Chairman of Tangarpali Block and Dr Baikuntha Nath Kashyap MOI/ C, Mangaspur CHC-II awarded her on the occasion of ASHA award ceremony at Mangaspur CHC-II on 18th Nov 2010.

Axshya India GF TB Project

SEWAK is rendering partnership to Lepira Society, Health in Action and Sargipali TB Unit. for the implementation of Axshya India GF-9 TB Project in Sargipali and Mangaspur area of Tangarpali Block. The project is presently organizing awareness meetings for village level participants consisting of GKS Members, TB Patients receiving DOTs and Community members. It is also conducting soft skill trainings for health staff on effective communication, Conflict Resolution, Time Management and Teamwork building. Besides, there is also a Rural Health Care Provider Training on how to refer to signs and symptoms before leading a case to DMC for diagnosis.

SEWAK, with the help of ASHAs, is looking after 20 Sputum collection center covering un-served and underserved villages. Recently, it facilitated a training program of 23 CBOs five of which would be provided with seed money to conduct awareness programs in theirs and nearby villages.

At Mangaspur and Sargipali DMCs, TB forums were constituted for better coordination between service system and service providers. Emphasis was also laid on ICTC and DMC joint meetings for promoting cross referral between them.

A Life Saving Secret

During baseline assessment for coverage of FSW and MSM in the city, the project staff came across Jaya Mallick. A thirty-two year old mother of two kids, Jaya expressed her consent to cooperate in the project work. She agreed to share her personal and social background with the counselor. She stated that she was HIV positive and that following the demise of her husband, the wine shop was her only means to earn a livelihood. As the income from the wine shop was not adequate to provide for the kids, she occasionally offered sex for money. Jaya understood her risk behavior and the dynamics of HIV infection. She was fully aware that if she keeps sexual relation she is infecting others. But she had very few options left. She was already a part of the sex trade and she needed money to keep her and the children alive in the city.

Under T.I project, peer educators are employed in different hotspots to identify sex workers who could be subsequently persuaded to reduce their risk behaviors. Under the influence of a peer educator Jaya too started coming to the DIC meetings where she felt that it was also her responsibility to aware people against HIV/AIDS. In the meanwhile, Population Services International (PSI) had introduced Female Condoms. This initiative was outstanding as for those female sex workers whose clients are reluctant to use male condoms. The discovery proved to be a turning point in Jaya's career. Now she regularly uses female condom with her clients. "Female condom has empowered me to take decisions", she says, "It provides more pleasure and protects my life as well as my partner's".



Targeted Intervention on HIV/AIDS

Female and male sex workers anywhere are most vulnerable and highly prone to HIV infections. These vulnerable segments of urban population who are driven towards sex work due to family or social compulsions not only die a miserable death but also infect others with the epidemic.

With support received from OSACS, SEWAK has been implementing Targeted Intervention Project in Rourkela Municipality, Steel Township, Plant Site and Slums Area of Rourkela since October 2008. The project targets around 250 Female Sex Workers (FSW) and 150 Men having Sex with Men (MSM). It seeks to control high-risk behavior of the target population, such as unprotected sex and STI, and provide them with innovative and effective BCC. Other components include, lobby and advocacy for people living with HIV/AIDS, setting up PPP clinics for treatment of STI and undertaking activities for socio-economic development of the target community.

SHIKSHA CHETANA PROJECT

In the year 2008, the EDUKANS Foundation of Netherland pioneered an education based program in India to avail and ensure relevant and quality education for the under privileged children between the age group of 6 to 14 years, and to mainstream the drop outs and non enrolled youngsters between the age group of 15 to 18 years. The program called Shiksha Chetana was implemented in cluster approach in Keonjhar and Sundargarh district. SEWAK as a partner of the network is implementing the program in 12 revenue villages of Meghadega & Gambharidihi Gram Panchayat of Tangarpali Block covering a total population of 7817 living in 1822 households. The first phase of the program would come to an end by July, 2011 and soon be followed by another 3 year term focusing entirely on lobby and advocacy.

Thematically, the program focuses on following important areas.

Education and Work: Increasing the relevance of education by expanding its content to include expertise, skills and attitudes that are supportive of generating an income

Education for Marginalized Peoples: Promoting and supporting the right to relevant and good-quality education for politically, economically and culturally marginalised peoples, and

Local Solutions: Increasing access to relevant vocation training for the youngsters by means of feasible, affordable and sustainable local solutions

The program employs certain strategies that work towards accomplishment of these thematic objectives.

Puspha's Way to Success



Pushpa Hasda lives with her four sisters and parents in Tinkuda village. The entire family depends on the income of their father. Pushpa's father work in other's houses on daily wages. The source of income is very limited. Like her other sisters, Puspa had to discontinue school after class II to help around the house. Her future was unsecure and she was undoubtedly heading for a life of poverty and drudgery. In the meanwhile, SEWAK under the Shiksha Chetana program conducted a livelihood based training on Poultry Rearing at Tinkuda for drop outs and non enrolled girls of the village. Pushpa was also enrolled for the training where she learnt some interesting aspects of poultry rearing. To her great amazement, she was given five Banraj chicks by the programme staff at the end of the training. Puspha reared the chicks with great affection and care and succeeded in keeping all of them alive and kicking. In six months time, the grown up chicks started to lay eggs. Pushpa got around three hundred large eggs from the hens. She set aside few eggs for incubation and sold the rest in neighbourhood for a good price. In a few days, ten more chicks hatched from the eggs raising her stock of poultry to fifteen heads. Her sisters also began to help her in her work. Now Pushpa is planning to purchase more chicks and set up a poultry farm.

Direct Poverty Alleviation: Under ‘Earn while you learn’ activities, 06-14 year old children acquire knowledge on different income generating skills which helps them to increase their confidence level for earning a livelihood in future. In 2009-10, twenty-three livelihood based skill trainings were conducted in 11 different category.

Strengthening Civil Society: Shiksha Chetana puts emphasis on the Civil Society Organizations like; SHG/VEC/PTA/MTA/ EWG and PRI by guiding them through different orientation, training, exposure and interfaces, so that, with common purpose & combined strength, they will be able to pressure government for qualitative input to educational sector.

During the previous year the volunteers prepared 13 Village Educational Plans at community meetings, oriented 628 members of 60 VECs, MTAs and PTAs, and involved 1152 WSHGs members in enrollment drives. They also organized rallies, community-government interfaces and press conference to air community demands.

Lobby & Advocacy: Very often, the policies and program drawn out by the government do not get implemented properly at the ground level. While monitoring the process at the ground level the Community and Civil Society Organizations, may take recourse to lobby & advocacy to change the course of events in desired directions.

Another component of the program is the ‘child club’ where the children interact with peers in a formal environment and develop his outlook on various subjects. Some child clubs in the program areas have started gather money to help poor and needy students.

Diversions that force to learn



Swami Vivekananda Shiksha Niketan (SVSN)

Swami Vivekananda Shiksha Niketan (SVSN) is now nine years old. SEWAK started this English Medium School on its premises at Rangiamunda in 2002 to bring CBSE patterned English Medium Education within easy reach of the children belonging to nearby areas.

Rangiamunda/Bandhapali area is graced by the presence of some older educational establishments including primary schools, high Schools, and a school for physically challenged including a junior college within a two-kilometer radius. However, for education in English Medium the child had to travel a distance of 15 kilometers to Sundargarh town. SEWAK's initiative has closed this gap by offering the required facility at a convenient location.

Presently, the school provides schooling up to elementary stream. Among others situational advantages, the school enjoys the serenity of SEWAK's large campus with teak and other plantation and the sense of purposive enthusiasm and disciplined teamwork that permeates its atmosphere. The School has total staff strength of eight including two non-teaching staff. SEWAK arranges for orientation programs for the teaching faculty to keep them in tune with latest trends in schooling practices. Recently, the school administration was provided with a new Tata Magic for carrying students and staff from a distance.

Certain differences make SICA popular over others



SEWAK Institute for Computer Application

Knowledge of Computer Application is essential for many jobs in modern times, but owing to the rising course fees and absence of training institutes in rural area, many students fail to take advantage of the facility. Keeping this in view, SEWAK, in 2007 started a low-cost DCA level computer-training program for the benefit of students from rural and tribal background. For the purpose, it sought a franchise from the computer-training firm IPHL. The program was immensely popular among High School Pass-outs and College Students.

Prior to the end of agreement with IPHL in 2010, SEWAK itself, had applied for an ISO Certificate and following due verifications, an ISO certification (**ISO 9001:2008 (E)**), was awarded to it for Quality Management System. Christened as "SEWAK Institute of Computer Application (SiCa)", the maiden institute would go a long way to add to SEWAK's efforts of empowering excluded rural and tribal youths of the district. At this time, SiCa operate at two centers: on the SEWAK Head office premises at Rangiamunda and at Lephripara town. Both the centers have registered high enrollment of students in the inaugural sessions.

One reason for the popularity of the program is longer exposure to computer interface. The other is the low charge imposed on the student. The course fee charged from each students currently stands at Rs 900/- and Rs 2,400/- for DCA and PGDCA level courses respectively, in comparison to Rs 4,500/- and Rs 8,500/- charged by other eligible institutes in Sundargarh & other towns.

SEWAK STREET THEATRE GROUP

SEWAK possesses a lengthy history of Street-Play performances. Initially, the founder of the organization took recourse to this powerful medium to win over young boys and girls to free skill-training courses offered at SEWAK campus. The practice also proved effective for collecting charity for flood & cyclone affected.

Until present day, most elements of the old troupe, including the scripts, artists, outfits and music have been allowed to exist with some adaptations. At present, the Street-Play troupe consists of sixteen performers, including female artists, singers and musicians, half of whom are part-timers engaged in different callings. They are self-made professionals with awful confidence and pragmatic viewpoints on life.

Today SEWAK has a repertory of over thirty excellent scripts to promote ambitious developmental schemes initiated by government and private foundations affecting public health, sanitation, family planning, election, governance, food, job securities and a host of other issues. The scripts are developed at SEWAK's own facility, putting in a good mix of witticism, and humour in vernacular medium.

Last year, the Street-Play team staged several performances for Urban Slum, Child Health, CHIN for CHANGE, Shiksha Chetana, RCH and Governance Programs.

Other Areas

WSHG Federation Development Program under Mission Shakti

Since November 2008, SEWAK has been providing consultancy and support to WSHG federation Development program in Sundargarh district. About 17532 no of WSHGs with membership strength of 196675 are participating in the program. Of them 10711 WSHGs have been covered under capacity building training and 836 WSHGs represented through 3378 members with skill up-gradation training. Six leaf-plate making units have been setup at Tangarpali, Hemgir, Lephirpara, Balisankara, Koida and Gurundia projects. A dal processing unit has come up in Lathikata project of Mission Shakti. In Balisankara and Kutra projects 25no of WSHGs have undertaken lac cultivation under which, income per group rose to Rs 55000/-per annum.

In a measure to decrease of MMR/ IMR at village level, in 2010-11, the Horticulture department supplied 68000 papaya, lemon, and drumstick saplings to WSHG member across the district. Convergence was also made with veterinary department for imparting training on Poultry and Goatery to WSHGs members. In Kuarmunda and Lathikata projects 8 no of WSHGs were provided with training and incentive for floriculture. Tie up was made with agriculture department for imparting training to WSHGs on vegetable cultivation. Across the district 2430 WSHGs are now involved in MDM, 14 WSHGs in Shakti Gaon and 167 WSHGs are retailing Kerosene in rural areas.

Orissa Forestry Sector Development Project

In these three years SEWAK field team rendered substantial support to the Forest Department Officers and Staff specially in the areas of community mobilization and empowerment of 96 Vana Samrakshyan Samitis and over 350 old and newly instituted Self Help Groups. The field team on several occasions played crucial role in resolution of conflict within and among contagious community members, facilitated plantation, forestprotection and conservation work of the VSS and promoted Income generating activities of SHGs.

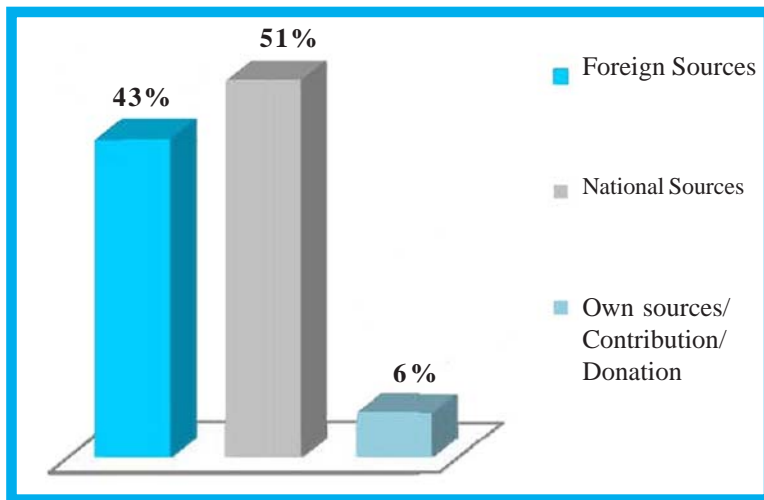

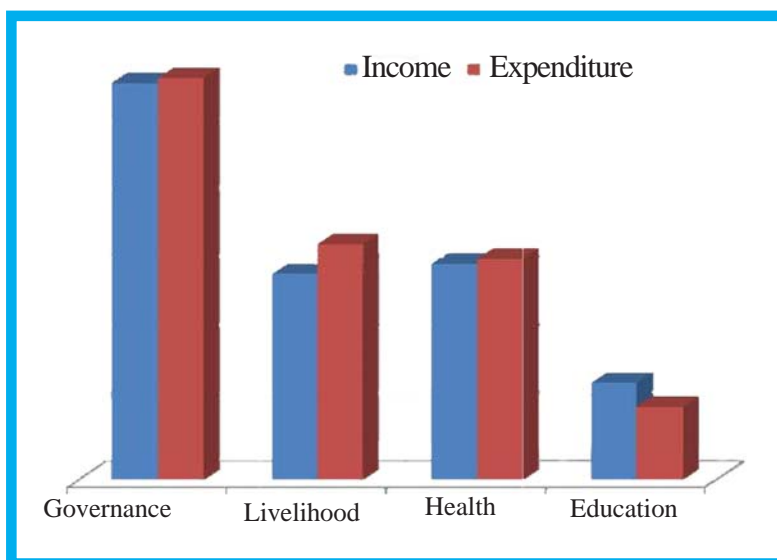
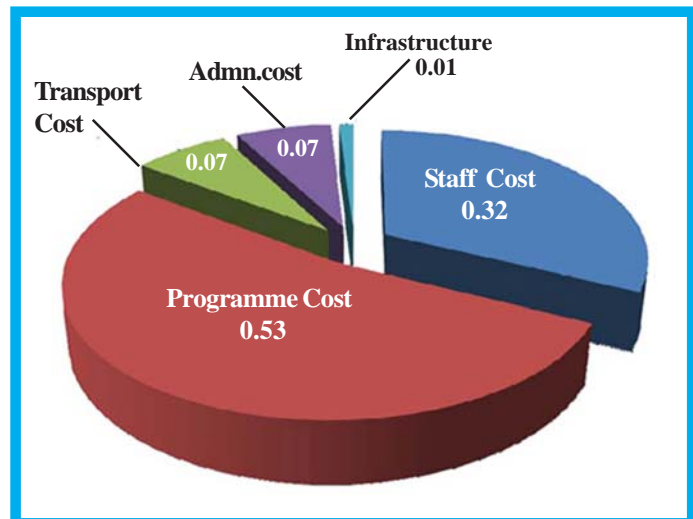
