

About the organization...

BACKGROUND & HISTORY

A group of youth from different parts of Sundargarh district, inspired by the then Youth Coordinator of Nehru Yuva Kendra Sundargarh Mr. Gopal Chandra Ojha started working collectively in 1995. With the support of the DRDA through the NYK Sundargarh few skill development programmes for the rural youth, plantation and nursery rising, formation and promotion of SHG groups were the initial activities by this group. A campus of around two acres at Rangiamunda in Tangarpali block of Sundargarh was developed as the center for all these activities. On 15thMay1995, SEWAK was registered under the Registration of Societies Act, XXI of 1860 at Sundargarh .Gradually by 1998 SEWAK Complex became the center of excellence for youth services in Sundargarh. SEWAK was the destination for more than 300 youth organizations.

Up to 1998 NYK Sundargarh was the resource mobilizer for SEWAK. With the transfer of Mr. Ojha to other district as the Youth Coordinator this chapter closed. The SEWAK management then struggled for resources. But the coordination with the district administration and the linkage with the Youth organizations of different parts of the district helped them to survive. During 2005 SEWAK came in contact with the Concern Worldwide India, Bhubaneswar, a Dublin based INGO which was a turning point for the organization. The handholding support provided by this organization really given a professional touch to SEWAK.



Objectives of the programme

- To enhance Livelihood Standard of common people and to create durable community assets by using MGNREGA as a tool.
- To ensure recognition on Tribal people's right over possessive forest land and Culture by using Forest Right Act, 2006, also of the other Traditional Forest Dwellers.
- To ensure accessibility of common people on Right to Food.

"The Full Moon on New Moon Night" - A case study

Turungagarh is a village under Meghdega Gram Panchayat in Tangarpal. Block of Sundargarh district. The village spreads its sprawl over forest surrounded hilly terrain of the region about six kilometers to the north of Meghdega Gram Panchayat office.

At present, 129 families have established their permanent homes here. Ninety of the families belong to the ST community, ten families are in the SC and OBC category and the remaining ten belong to general category. Over 70% of the people are poor, possessing at best, about one and half acres of agricultural land that provide sustenance for few months of the year. To support their families and cattle in the lean period, they gather fruits, flowers and other useful commodity from the forest.

Working with the poorest of the poor

SEWAK joined hands with Trickle Up a New York based agency having it's regional office at Kolkata in 2007 with the objective of livelihood development of poorest of the poor. The livelihood development component focuses on develo-ping socio-economic assets of the poor by promoting Income Generation Activities, awareness generation, training and collective social mobilization.

Previously the grant size for each project participant was 100 dollar and the project period was for one year only. It is revised in 2010 as a three The FRA title holders now evince much zeal in trimming and tiding up their newly acquired homestead and farm land. They have begun planting mango, guava, lemon, orange, papaya and drumstick plants surrounding their houses. SEWAK has helped nine of the Claimants to submit all required documents, along with photocopies of their new 'Patta' to the Horticulture Officer for benefitting from a subsidy linked scheme which will be operative in July 2011.

On 26th November 2011, a special programme was launched at Gailjore village in the presence of District level officials of different line department like- Integrated Tribal Development Agency (ITDA), District Rural Development Agency (DRDA), Horticulture department, Soil Conservation department, Forest Department, Agriculture department. The main objective of the programme was to inclusion of Forest Right title holder in MGNREGA. The programme was jointly organized by "\$EWAK" and District administration, Sundargarh. On that occasion 38 FRA title holders of Turungagarh village received work order of RS.12, 90,000/-for Land development and Farm Pond.

One of the FRA title holder Sri BalramPradhan of the village overwhelmed and said: - "as the shine of the full moon, MGNREGA and FRA brings delight in the life of poor forest dwellers. Really it's like full moon in the new moon night for the everyday life of poor forest dwellers of Turungagarh village".

Capacity Building support agency (CBSA) programme

OFSDP is a nine-year project (2006-15) executed under JFM mode by an autonomous society under the Forest & Environment Department of Govt. of Odisha. The project aims at restoration of degraded forests and empowerment of the forest-dependent communities.

Under the conviction that there existed huge scope of improvement in capacity building activities for the VSS members and the project staff, OFSDP launched the Capacity Building Support Agency Program in Jan-Feb, 2012. SEWAK as one of the support agency for Deogarh, Rourkela &Bonai Forest Division is required to provide consultancy and handholding support in planning, developing and organizing capacity building programs and post-training institutional development services.

Aims & Objectives:

The following are the specific objectives of the program

- Conduct comprehensive capacity building assessment and suggest capacity building strategy
- · Develop a cadre of resource persons on
- participatory & sustainable forest resource governance
- Implement capacity building and empowerment programmes for VSS
- Develop coordination and monitoring mechanism during and after the training for ensuring delivery of desired services.

Case Study: Nailing the Fellers

Ludhuni is a small village on the right bank of river Brahmani. In October, 2007, the SEWAK volunteers working under OFSDP facilitated formation of the first ever Vana Samrakshyan Samiti in the village. The VSS was allotted with a forest area of 158.2 hectare on the outer most skirt of Dhenkiam Reserve Forest. The villagers raised a nursery and carried out gap plantation on 70 hectare of forest land. The 75 house holds formed into 25 watcher groups and patrolled the forest area during the day time to spot wild fire and logging. They also set up bans to prevent straying of cattle into plantation area. The villagers themselves practiced restraints to minimize their dependence on forest resources.

The wood-fellers from the relatively urban village of Lahunipara, Rajamunda, Gudhiali, and Sialikudar looked at these developments with jealousy and unease. The Sal forest across the river was their heaven for hunting timber & firewood. They made few stray attempts to regain their sway over the wilderness, but the social fences put up by the villagers were too strong to break into. They began to threaten the villagers' entry to nearby bazzers, but the people did not compromise on the stand taken by them. After all, the bazzars were nobodies'.

In April, 2011 a group of six stealthily got into the VSS forest and felled two matured Sal trees. In the afternoon, some women heard the rattle and raised an alarm in the village. About 20 villagers moved to the forest and closed in on the fellers. Two of them darted into the dense and vanished from sight. The villagers took the others into custody. They took away the Tiffin boxes and axes and locked them inside the VSS office.

The persons spend the night inside the locked room. Next morning, the villagers gathered at the spot and opened the doors. They reprimanded the fellers and threatened to hand over them to the forester. They asked the fellers to apologize for the action. Finally they released them asking them to deposit a sum of five thousand to take home the axes and tins.

The fellers did not show up again. The Tiffin boxes and axes can still be found lying in the VSS office room.





SKILL DEVELOPMENT TRAINING

Skill Development Training for Rural Youth & SHG

Since 1996, SEWAK has been conducting skill training programs in carpentry, masonry, tailoring, soft toy making, and bamboo craft for illiterate, school drop-outs or only functionally literate rural

and tribal boys and girls under different governmental schemes like TRYSEM, RSVY, SGSY etc. The financial and technical support for these programs comes mostly from government sector agencies, like DRDA, ITDA and NABARD. Most of these trainings were residential and were spread over a period of 3 to 6 months, during which the trainees were accommodated in one or the other of two SEWAK campuses at Sundargarh. By March, 2011, a total of 3784 unemployed boys and girls of the district had graduated in these trades. Some of these trainees had set up small workshops, or working on contract.

TAILORING TRAINING FOR RURAL AND TRIBAL GIRLS

Tailoring is the most frequently performed training event on SEWAK campuses. Between April and June 2011, SEWAK organized a training program for 30 girls' trainees of Tangarpali Block area at SEWAK complex, Rangiamunda. At the end of the program, the trainees were facilitated with grade certificates by SEWAK's training department,

TRAINING PROGRAM ON TAILORING AND BAMBOO CRAFT UNDER SGSY

Between November 2011 and January 2012, SEWAK conducted training programs in the trades of tailoring (dress designing), terracotta and bamboo craft for rural youth under Swarana Jayanti Gramya Swarojagara Yojana (SGSY). A total of 150 girls and women participants took part in the training held at SEWAK head office complex and 7 other locations of 4 blocks of the district.

GRAM ROJGAR SEWAK (GRS) TRAINING

Between September and November 2011, SEWAK conducted series of orientation programs for the Gram RojgarSewak (GRS), a new generation of grass root level functionaries created under MGNREGA to promote implementation of the scheme, as well as manage information relating to it under an E-governance frame-work. They would





now handle details of job card holders, job demands, allocations, muster roll of labors and so on, taking up much of the workload of the block level Computer Programmer (CP), who previously handled these affairs.

The 3-day orientation program consisting of seven (7) Technical Sessions touched on topics like, the three tires of Panchayati Raj System and MGNREGA. It went into details of maintenance of record, muster roll, and preparation of labor budget. The issues of transparency and accountability, involving social audit, block level public hearing, vigilance and monitoring committee, and grievance redressal under MGNREGA also came under focus. The last day of the training was exclusively devoted to E-Governance that included topics like e-muster roll and on-line monitoring of MGNREGA.

The State Institute of Rural Development (SIRD), Bhubaneswar provided support for the program. Empanelled resource persons of SIRD conducted the classes using different methods such as lecture, discussion, interaction, practical demonstration, power point presentations and so on The entire program was conducted in 10 batches consisting of 35-40 GRC in each. A total of 370 GRSs from three districts Sundargarh, Jharsuguda and Deogarh took part in the orientation program held at Rural Resource Centre (RRC) premises.

Entrepreneurship Development Programme

The Prime Minister's Employment Generation Program (PMEGP) creates self-employment opportunities for educated youth by promoting subsidy-linked micro-enterprises in rural and urban areas of the country. The selected beneficiary is sanctioned a collateral-free loan in the range of five to twenty five lakhs to start an enterprise in the convenience of his/her native environment. At the district level, the program is implemented through the District Industries Centre (DIC) and identified Banks.

The Entrepreneurship Development Program (EDP) contains topics like systematic approaches, costing, pricing and profit management, TAT, material management, account and book keeping, quality management, IT factors, sustainability precautions, product diversification, designing and packaging, marketing strategies, sale tax and income tax provisions and so forth. At the end of the session, the trainees were taken to a successful enterprise for an exposure.

During 2011-12, SEWAK, for the second year in succession conducted another series of Trainings for the sanctioned year 2010-11. A total of 107 entrepreneurs undertook training in six batches while boarding at SEWAK Rural Resource Center.

Seed Treatment campaign

AGRICULTURE PROGRAMME

Govt. of Odisha under the Rastriya Krusi Vikas Yojana started the Seed Treatment Campaign or Seed dressing in the state. The campaign is a chemical, typically antimicrobial with which seeds are treated (or "dressed") prior to planting. Seed treatments can be an environmentally more friendly way of using pesticides as the amount used is very small.

SEWAK with the cooperation of Agriculture department implement the programme in 14 villages of 3 blocks in Sundargarh district namely Sadar, Subdega& Balisankara block.

Under this programme, SEWAK had organized awareness campaign for the farmers in the area with the district officials on Seed treatment. An awareness Ratha was used for the awareness of the farmers through miking and the farmers were supplied free medicines for the seed treatment.

Maize cultivation:

Maize cultivation has been taken up in 40,000 hectares by Government of Odisha. The cultivation has been taken up in 21 districts of the state.

Before release of the cheque, there would be field visit by the agriculture officials.

While the Agriculture Technology Management Agency (ATMA) will ensure the timely arrival of seeds, the seed companies will organise one training programme for each 100 hectares and will organise at least one field day for 500 hectares at their own cost.

For Sundargarh district SEWAK was involved in the programme and implemented it for 8 blocks starting from Hemgir up to Rajgangpur. 722 farmers were selected for the programme. Out of 1150 hect 508 hect, were used for the maize cultivation.

FELICITATION OF NEWLY ELECTED PR MEMBERS

For the last 17 years SEWAK has been implementing its projects and programmes for the development of the rural poor.

So there is a need to join hands and build up relation with the Sarpanch, Samiti members and the Zilla Parishad members. In this context SEWAK had organized a welcome ceremony for the newly elected PR functionaries of Tangarpali & Lephripara block with its own initiatives. The programme was designed as the motivational camp for the newly elected members. In both the blocks the Block Development Officers &Zilla Parishad President were invited.

In this programme the experts of different projects of SEWAK made presentations on the schemes & provisions of the state & central govt. regarding the Health, Education & Livelihoods.

HEALTH SECTION

Reducing HIV/AIDS through behavioral change (Targeted Intervention on HIV/AIDS) Awareness meeting on World AIDS Day

Female and male sex workers anywhere are most vulnerable and highly prone to HIV infection. These vulnerable segments of urban population who are driven towards sex work due to family or social compulsions not only die a miserable death but also infect others with the epidemic.

SEWAK has been implementing the Targeted Intervention (TI) Project on HIV/AIDS for 300 Female Sex worker (FSW) & 200 Men having sex with men (MSM) in Rourkela Municipality, Steel Township, Plant site and slum areas of Rourkela, supported by the Odisha State Aids Control Society (OSACS). The main component of the project is to control the high risk behavior of the target group, such as unprotected sex and STI, and provide them innovative & effective BCC.

"A new hope to a mundane life"

Rourkela is an industrial hub of Sundargarh district having greater scope to adopt variety of professions and occupations. This for the reason slums in Rourkela city are mushrooming like anything simultaneously poverty is also on the pace. Slum often invites many diseases with red carpets and also with HIV infection this is because of poverty, lack of information and many other social problems which persist in the slum areas. As Rourkela Town ship attracts many people to earn livelihood, sex trade has also become a medium to earn money and thus HIV/AIDS is also spreading like wild fire.

In order to halt and reverse the spread of HIV virus SEWAK has undertaken Targeted Intervention program on FSW and MSM in Rourkela and it's periphery from 2008 supported by Orissa State AIDS Control Society (OSACS) with the target of 300 FSW and 200 MSM

Mamata Das (false name) is one of the elite sex worker of Rourkela says "My charges are high, and people are willing to pay". Her entry into sex work follows a familiar trajectory. Married at the age of 14 to an irresponsible drunkard; she was soon left with two children to support, while he wasted all his time and his money on other women.

Her husband came down with Brain Malaria despite many trips to big and expensive hospitals and eventually died despite his wife's best efforts." I had to raise my children, and I took sex work voluntarily "She says. There was a pimp through which she entered into this sex work.

When she first began to work, Mamta used to get 12-15 clients every day. Earning was better then. She has regular as well as irregular clients, and thats way some money keeps coming in with which she supports her household. "I had absolutely no idea about safe sex practice and didn't know how to use condoms. I thought it was only to avoid pregnancy" but that, she was also unaware of STI and HIV/AIDS. I never used condom. I always left it to the wish of the client, but things changed when I first got infected with STI".

She only learnt about them after interactions with SEWAK T.I Project She now insists on the use of condoms with her clients and secured herself from STI and HIV and now she is an active peer volunteer, is an enthusiastic participant in all Targeted Intervention Programme activities. She has also learnt to start saving money. She has found anew purpose to her mundane life. She says.





PPP Urban Health Project

A major part of the country's population residing in the slums and they are facing lots of problems in there. The govt facilities and provisions are far away from them and they are surrounded with over-congestion, poverty and illiteracy. Many serious social problems and health complications, including HIV/AIDs breed in the slum, calling for the special attention of government and health authorities. SEWAK has been running one of the eleven 1st tier Urban Health Centers at Tilkanagar in Bondhamunda, Rourkela since 1st November 2007. The Project is supposed to give coverage to 18 slums with a total population of 20,002.

Service delivery, community mobilization, and behavior change communication (BCC) are the basic components under the project. During the year 2011-12, 285 Rourkela Government Hospital and among them 152 women were given financial support for institutional delivery. As the family planning 73 women adopt the tubecotomy.

To create awareness on reproductive health issues among the youngsters, 30 Balika Mandals have been formed.

30 community Based Distribution centers have been formed for social Marketing of contraceptives and 7 CBD trainingswere organized on contraceptive promotion.

Transit Migrant Programme

As per the decision taken by Orissa State AIDS Control Society, SEWAK has entrusted to run a Migrant intervention programme at Rourkela Rly station. In order to address prevention and control of HIV/AIDS programme among migrants. The proposed awareness programme was inaguagreted on Dated-26/10/2010 in the presence of Dr. Bikrant Kindo CDMO Sundargarh and Dr. Rajendra Kumar Pattnaik, CMO Rourkela Government Hospital.

In order to manage this awareness activity two Out Reach workers (ORW) have been appointed. During the course of our intervention it is found that people are migrating from different parts of India to Orissa like from Uttar Pradesh, Madhya hPradresh, Bihar, Jharkand, West Bengal and vice versa. Through this intervention they are getting information about dynamics of HIV/STI and this programme is duly getting approval in providing and sharing for greater intervention and mainstreaming the epidemic. As large number of in-migrants and out migrant flow is to be continues in the district. Sponge Iron and other ancillary industries are attracting these people for their livelihood. Therefore through this programme, HIV prevention can be minimized to a larger extent.

Ensuring health éntitlements for the rural community (Communicating Health India Network (CHIN) Project



Training to HW on NRHM entitlements

In January 2010 SEWAK started the CHIN project in 13 GPs of Tangarpali block of Sundargarh district with the support from CMAI, Bhubaneswar. The project seeks to reinforce NRHM by building up





capacities of different stakeholders to generate adequate demand for service on one side and commensurate and prompt service delivery on the other. The project carries the aspects of communication, health, advocacy, grass root & empowerment to fulfill the goals of ensuring universal access to health facilities.

In the two years of intervention, certain changes have been made in the project area and also at the target group:

 PRI, GKS, ASHAs, AWWs, SHG, Youth & Farmers are actively participating in Village Health Plan

- Qualitative change in VHND organization; ASHAs, AWWs and ANMs organize the event punctually
- Reclamation of Swasthyakantha (Instruction Walls) with regular updating by service providers
- Mass awareness generation through street play on Mother & Child health in the area
- Awareness generation of ASHAs & GKS members on GaonSwasthyaBaithak.
- Active involvement of the project staff in Intensive Pulse Polio Immunization programme



EYES BLOOMING WITH JOY

Kurla is a remote village in Tangarpali block of Sundargarh district. BasumatiNeti (age 12) is the younger daughter of Mr. Lalchan Neti and Mrs. Sulochana Neti. Her parents maintain their pangs of hunger through daily wages. She is reading in class VII in Govt. PUP School of Kurla.

Even in the poor economic condition the life was peaceful and full of joy for the family members, but it was an unfortunate day for the family in the month of April in 2010 because when the whole village is calm & quiet in the mid night a Kerosene lamp was burst in Basumati's home and the little girl was burnt. The neck and the upper chest of left hand side was affected. In that time GKS Kurla

had provided their moral support to the family by Rs 500 rupees for her treatment. Basumati's parents went for the local traditional treatment in Salepali village. After ten month of treatment she was quite cured. But the head was attached with Chest through a cord and the left arm was attached with chest thus Basumati was unable to move the head, talk and raise the hand.

As the CHIN project was implemented in the Tangarpaliblock,On 18th Oct 2011 the CMAI Delhi Monitoring team went to meet the GKS of Kurla for the evaluation of CHIN project. During the visit the case of Basumati came up.

With the support of SEWAK Basumati went to SCB medical college Cuttack and Dr.B.B. Naik, Surgery Specialist prepared a draft expenditure of Rs 30, 000/-(thirty thousand Rupees only).

The estimated financial cost was jointly arranged by CMAI Delhi, GKS Kurla, Gram Panchyat Mangaspur and SEWAK. The operation was performed successfully on 10th May 2012 within three hours (11am to 2pm). Throughout the period SEWAK and the CMAI staffs were with the family. Now Basumati is completely cured and living a normal life.



KNOW TB FOR NO TB (AXSHYA INDIA GF TB PROJECT)



Sensitization meeting on TB

SEWAK has been implementing the Axshya India GF 9 TB project support RNTCP to decrease morbidity and mortality due to drug resistant with the support of LEPRA Society'in Sundargarh district. The project engage communities and community based care providers to improve TB care control. specially marginalized and vulnerable population including TB-HIV patient. Sensitization meetings are organized for the GKS members, youth, SHG, CBOs, PRI members on causes, sign and symptoms of TB and sputum testing facilities and DOTs.In Sundargarh 357 suspect refer to DMC 0f which 169 reported to DMC and out of that 18 found positive. The health providers are provided training on interpersonal skill or soft skill training including the components of Effective Communication,-Team Work, Time Management and Conflict Resolution.

TB Forum - Changed the Life of Lundri

LundriOram, a 65 Years old widow woman, was suffering from TB leaving with her Son, Daughter in Law, Grand Son and Grand Daughter in Khutagaon Village, Tangarpali Block of Sundargarh district. Due to ignorance and lack of knowledge her condition was deteriorated day by day. Lastly her son took her to the District TB Center, Sundargarh. After all the necessary investigations, mainly by Sputum Examination, her report was positive and confirmed as TB. She was under observation for 3 months regular treatment in DOTS Strategy and when she felt quiet better stopped the treatment suddenly.

on 24th December, 2011 SEWAK had organized the quarterly review meeting of District TB forum at Lundri's village. The President, Secretary and all the members of TB forum along with the District Coordinator, (LEPRA Society) Programme Staff, DTO, STS and STLS were present there sensitized on RNTCP, Cause, Signs, Symptoms, available facilities, DOTS, DOTS Plus and the expected role of TB Forum etc. Lundri was also a part of the meeting, she listened everything carefully and she realized the irregularities made by her in taking medicines will affect other persons and mainly to the close relation, doesn't want spread her disease to her lovely family, mainly to her grand children.

After the meeting was over she went to the ASHA and assured to take regular and complete treatment of all the remaining doses/duration of treatment

Now Lundri is not only leaving a happy & healthy life but also acting as a change agent to detect and cure many TB Patients through TB Forum.



BREAST FEEDING - BEST FEEDING (PROJECT SURAKSHYA)



Awareness meeting of the lactating mothers of breast feeding

With UNICEF support channelized through Orissa Voluntary Health Association (OVHA), SEWAK is implementing Surakshya Project in all the blocks of Sundargarh district as lead partner in a network of 16 district based NGOs. The program aims at creating sensitization, awareness, and advocacy for Infant and Young Child Feeding (IYCF) practices and promoting BCC in target population.

SEWAK organized a one-day orientation training of CDPOs and Senior Lady Supervisors of ICDS (Integrated Child Development Scheme) projects

from all 17 community blocks at Pragati Mandap, Sundargarh on 17 August 2011. Following the orientation, the CDPOs and Supervisors would constitute a Monitoring & Facilitating Team each for undertaking subsequent activities regarding implementation of the scheme in respective projectarea.

Breast milk, Nectar for the baby



Saudamini Khilei, W/O- Chaitanya Khilei, Village:-Rupabahal, Dist:- Sundargarh.

Saudamini got married at the age of 19 years to Chaitanya Khilei of Rupabahal. She is std. VIIIth pass and her husband is VII pass. Her husband works at Kirei Spinning mill as a daily labourer. They don't have any landed property. They belong to BPL category. She lives with her Mother-in-law, Husband and the new born baby.

When she was pregnant she attended a programme conducted by SEWAK on Brest feeding under "SURAHSHYA" project. She was totally ignorant on "child care, breast feeding, condition of a pregnant and lactating mother". She could learn the following four messages by attending the programme. The messages were,

- Feeding of colostrums within one hour of the child birth.
- Feeding of only mother's milk up to six months.
- Feeding of supplementary food along with breast feeding only after six months.
- Interaction with the child during breast feeding.

On 20th June 2012 she gave birth her child at the District Headquarter Hospital, Sundargarh. It was a low weight (below 2 kg) baby. Just after 1/2 hour, Saudamini fed the colostrums with the help of ASHA Sauki Patel. She has been doing only breast feeding after that. As a result of comprehensive breast feeding the baby has 8-10 urinations a day. She has been feeding the baby with one breast as long as the baby has stopped licking on it's own. It has been gaining weight by 600 gms within a month. Her mother-in-law attend husband are happy to see the healthy baby. "Only due to breast feeding the baby is healthy" her husband says.

Saudamini says "I could learn about the Breast feeding and Child care only from the SURAKSHYA project".





VILLAGE CONTACT DRIVE ON CHILD HEALTH ISSUES

The village Contract Drive Programme was held in 5 villages namely Tinkuda, Siabahal, Lemlema, Telendihi&Adakatha of Tangarpali block. SEWAK pre -published the event through miking, poster, banners, orientation to GKS members and village leaders. The programmes were organized by SEWAK and supported by NRHM.

Objective of the programme

- To sensitize the community on child rearing practices that contribute to the high IMR.
- To take up IPC at village level to sensitize Pregnant Women, Lactating Mothers as well as mothers with children under 5 on child mortality issues.
- To promote institutional linkage of child rearing practices with the communication channel.

RASTRIYA SWASTHYA BIMA YOJANA (R.S.B.Y)

Rashtriya Swasthya Bima Yojana(RSBY) is Government supported health insurance scheme for the poor. It provides cashless insurance for hospitalization in public as well private hospitals. Every BPL (Below Poverty Line) family bolding a yellow ration card pays Rs 30/- as registration fee to get a bio matric enabled smart card containing their fingerprints and photographs. This enables them to receive inpatient medical care of up to Rs 30000/- per family per year in any of the empanelled hospitals. Pre- existing illness are covered from days one, for head of households, spouse and up to three dependent or parents.

Since 2011 SEWAK running the RSBY Help Desk in 11nos. Govt. Hospital of Sundargarh district.

JANANI SEWA PROGRAMME (24X7 HELPLINE)

Janani Sewa Program was launched in June-July, 2008 in Sundargarh district as a new initiative under NRHM for helping pregnant women and community to overcome barriers such-as lack of prompt referral transport, absence of a round-the-clock counseling center on pregnancy & neo-natal care related health risks and instant checking off of availability of consumables as blood for treatment. The project envisages a 24 × 7 hour helpline






running from a tele-counseling center at the district headquarters hospital and many JananiSewa ambulances stationed at convenient locations in the district. Sundargarh District Periphery Development Society has provided ten ambulances to be located at each of the 10 first phase block hospital for promoting project activities.

The counseling and referral transport services could be reached from any place in the district by dialing a toll free no. 9437701234. The number is readily available with each of the 2263 ASHAs working at hamlet level.

Subdega, Bargaon, Kutra and Rajgangpur block in 28 batches.

The training module comprises on Role clarity of ASHA, care of Pregnant women, Use of NISCHAY Kit, Component of Antenatal Care, Birth Preparedness, Essential Knowledge of Birth Companion, Examination of New borne home visit, hand washing, how to weight new born, supporting and counseling the mother for breasting to New born child and continued exclusive breast feeding for six months. Care of Eye, Umbilical Cord and Skin care. Thermal Control, Diagnosing and Managing of Hypothermia and fever etc.

ASHA TRAINING



6th & 7th Module Training of ASHAs at SEWAK ASHA (Accredited Social Health Activist) is the main pillar of NRHM. She works within one thousand population of a community. She guides the poor and vulnerable community to maintain a good

ASHAs are working since 2006-2007 in our district. At present 2383 ASHAs are there in Sundargarh district. Due to their cooperation and hard work IMR is 29/1000, MMR is 206/ 1 lakh live birth, institution delivery is 86 % and full immunization is 96% in Sundargarh district. Between 28th October 2011 to 15th January 2012, a total 848 ASHAs have received 6th and 7th Module training from Tangarpali, Hemgir, Sargipali, Sadar, Balisankara,

EDUCATION SECTION

Ensuring quality education (Shikshya Chetana Programme)

With the support of Edukans, Netherland a programme called 'ShikshyaChetana' was implemented in Odisha in a cluster approach for Sundargarh & Keonjhar district in a network of 8 partners. The objective of the programme is to ensure relevant & quality education for the under privileged children between 6 to 14 years and mainstream the non-enrolled and drop out youngsters between the age group of 15 to 18 years. SEWAK as a partner implementing the programme in two GPs of Tangarpali block in Sundargarh i.e. Meghdega&Gambharidihi. Through this programme SEWAK is covering 12 revenue villages and 52 hamlets with a population





of 7817 living in 1822 households. The first phase of the programme was for 3 years up to 31st July, 2011 and the new term is started from 1st August 2011 to 31st July 2014.

- 3 strategies have been adopted with a cluster approach in the operational areas:
- Direct Poverty Alleviation (DPA): Under this strategy focus has been on increasing access to relevant good-quality education to the children of 6-14 years by means of feasible,

affordable, and sustainable (local) solutions and also vocational training for the school dropouts.


- Strengthening Civil Society: Strengthening the capacity of civil society actors, develop their capacity to promote relevant and good-quality education.

EDUCATION GIVES VALUE TO LIFE

As the Right to Education Act, 2009 came into force in Odisha from 27th September, 2010; the State Govt. is committed to ensure free and compulsory education for all the 6 to 14 years children but still it has not properly reached to the grass root level.

Budabahal is a revenue village of Meghdega GP in Tangarpali block and Amrutnagar is a hamlet which is



By order of School & Mass Education, Dept. of Odisha, all schools were celebrating the enrollment drive (ShikshyaChetanaAbhiyan) from 1st April to 15th April. But in that time, every year Soundarya and his mates had gone to a nearby village for brick making. They were staying there for 6 months from the month of December up to June and the children are staying with them for those times in much deteriorated condition.

From the local AWW the SEWAK functionaries came to know about these children. With the support of HataMajhi, SMC President &GopalaBhoi, Ex-Ward member SEWAK staff moved to the brick kiln to have a discussion with the parents of those children and it was found that there were 8 children with their parents.

After having a long discussion with the parents of those children, they were realized that like the livelihood, education is also important in life. Then they were committed to admit their children and send them regularly to school and also requested the State govt. through SEWAK to make special provisions for those migrant children to cover up the syllabus of the total year in the rest of the months.





COMPUTER EDUCATION FOR THE RURAL YOUTHS

Now a day Computer knowledge is essential for employees or students. But high rate of course fees very often becomes huddles for the poor rural youth. Keeping this in view, SEWAK, in 2007 started a low-cost DCA level computer training program.

ISO certification (ISO 9001:2008(E)), was taken in 2010 and "SEWAK Institute of Computer Application (SICA)" was opened. At this time, SICA operates at three centers: at SWAK Head office premises at Rangiamunda, Lephripara and Chakrpur in Lephripara block. All the centers have registered high enrollment of students.

The course fee charged from each students currently stands at Rs 1500/-, Rs 3000/- and Rs. 1000/- for DCA, PGDCA & TALLY level courses respectively, in comparison to Rs. 4,500/- and Rs. 8,500/- charged by other institutes at Sundargarh & other towns.

- To address the issues of child labor/working children, child migration and child trafficking by enhancing family income through leveraging various government entitlements.
- To ensure child participation in decision making process.

A STEP TOWARDS CHILDHOOD CARE

Matikhol is a remote village in Lephripara block, around 210 populations residing in this village. Most of them depend on agriculture, animal rearing and NTFP collection. Ranjita Kerketa resides in this village. She has lost her husband just two month ago. Her family consists of four of daughters and two sons. She does not have any kind of dependable income to look after her family. Ranjita Kerketa also a poor lady cannot send the children to a school. The children have to earn themselves to feed the whole family.

So one day Ranjita thought to sell one of the children Kamala to a prospective buyer in Sundargarh. The deal was to be executed the next day. In the mean while the AWW of Bhandrkhol inform the cry project staff working in Lephripada block in Sundargargh about the deal. Community Organizer Mr. Amit Naik rushed to the spot. He persuaded Ranjita to admit the child in BhediBahal Ashram school. At last Ranjita changed her mind.

Shortly afterward kamala took admission in Bhedibahal ashram shool.




